Background:

BlueGreen Preservation and Development, LLC is an industry leader in developing and preserving affordable housing. They have extensive experience in family, senior, urban, suburban, HUD preservation and neighborhood revitalization developments. BlueGreen uses that experience to improve the lives of the residents in their properties while maximizing the return on investment for stakeholders. Their affordable housing properties utilize the same quality design and construction as market-rate housing properties.

BlueGreen achieves this goal by adhering to strict disciplines throughout the development and rehabilitation process. By engaging in strategic partnerships with their valued partners and by continually developing relationships with national and regional governmental agencies, they have the ability to shepherd the process to a successful closing. What sets BlueGreen apart from other real estate developers is their commitment to retaining the character and social service benefits indigenous to each community, which is achieved by partnering with the existing local non-profit organization. The EE Cleveland Manor Apartments project is an acquisition/rehabilitation of a 54-unit affordable multi-family housing development for the elderly. The project is made up of 13 studio apartments, 40 one-bedroom and one 2-bedroom manager's unit. EE Cleveland Manor is located at 2611 EC Reems Court, Oakland, California. The rehabilitation will be done with the tenants in place and will include upgrading air conditioning and heating units, mechanical and electrical. Interior upgrades will include new kitchen and bathroom equipment, new cabinets, new kitchen surfaces, new flooring, paint and new window treatments. Exterior upgrades will include replacement of certain patio covers, widening of common area pathways, common area lighting, improvements to community areas, parking area improvements and paint. This financing will preserve 53 units of affordable housing for the City of Oakland for another 55 years.

Background:

The International School of the Peninsula ("ISTP") is an independent, co-educational, non-sectarian bilingual immersion day school with two Nursery – 5th grade programs (French Immersion and Mandarin Chinese Immersion) and an international middle school.

ISTP was established as a French immersion school in 1979, and was named the Peninsula French American School. Founded by Charlotte de Géry with a small group of parents and friends, the school originally opened its doors to nine students. Today, they have grown to approximately 585 students across two campuses.

ISTP is a unique school that uniquely prepares its students for the challenges of an interconnected, 21st century world. Through ISTP's rigorous, inquiry-based French immersion or Chinese immersion (Mandarin) education, their students are able to develop the superior critical thinking abilities and mental flexibility associated with being bilingual. Since 1979, ISTP has been educating students through culture and language. They take great pride in their ability to give students the tools needed to richly experience and succeed in the world.

ISTP is committed to being a leader in international bilingual education while providing their students with a transformative educational journey that encourages compassion, independence, action and gratitude. Their mission is to educate students through a rigorous and dynamic bilingual program, inspiring them to develop an inquisitive and responsible international mindset.

The proceeds of the Bonds will be used to refinance the Project from time to time on the terms and conditions set forth below and to prepay and retire all of the outstanding California Statewide Communities Development Authority Refunding Revenue Bonds (International School of the Peninsula Project) Series 2006, previously issued to finance and refinance all or a portion of the Borrower's facilities at 151 Laura Lane, Palo Alto, California 94303. The bonds originally issued were used to purchase, renovate, and equip the school's campus.

Background:

Community Medical Centers is the business name used by the group of entities comprising the comprehensive health care organization described herein (collectively, "CMC"). CMC serves Fresno County (the "County") and the surrounding California Central Valley area consisting of Kern, Kings, Mariposa, Madera and Tulare counties (the "Central Valley"). CMC serves the needs of a diverse community, offering medical services throughout the region through a comprehensive hospital network, the largest regional physician panel in the Central Valley, and a variety of outpatient programs and services. Through a number of facilities, CMC offers medical, surgical and emergency services, family birth, pediatrics, skilled nursing, home care and outpatient care. In addition to the size and diversity of its facilities, CMC offers a variety of specialized services, including the Central Valley's only Level I trauma and burn center (one of only five such facilities in California) and a Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. CMC also provides a graduate medical education program affiliated with the University of California at San Francisco ("UCSF") medical education program.

The Obligated Group consists of Community Hospitals of Central California and Fresno Community Hospital and Medical Center (each a "Member," and collectively, the "Members" of the Obligated Group or the "Obligated Group"). The Obligated Group does not include any other entity within CMC. The Members of the Obligated Group are the sole obligors with respect to the Bonds and Obligation No. 8. No other entity within Community Medical Centers' group of entities is obligated with respect to the Bonds or Obligation No. 8.

The proceeds of the Bonds, together with other available funds, are expected to be used to (i) finance and/or reimburse the prior payment of a portion of the costs of constructing and equipping a 100,000 square foot regional cancer treatment and research center (the "Cancer Center"), which will be located on the campus of Clovis Community Medical Center (the "Project"), (ii) prepay all certificates of participation (the "2007 Certificates"), originally executed and delivered for the benefit of the Obligated Group on May 16, 2007 in the aggregate principal amount of \$320,615,000, (iii) prepay all or a portion of certain other certificates of participation (the "2009 Certificates"), originally executed and delivered for the benefit of the Obligated Group on October 8, 2009 in the aggregate principal amount of \$210,000,000 and (iv) pay costs of issuing the Bonds. The refunding and prepayment of any portion of the 2009 Certificates will be accomplished only to the extent that certain savings targets can be achieved. Management of CMC expects to determine the amount of 2009 Certificates, if any, that will be refunded and prepaid at the time the Bonds are priced.

Meeting: January 13, 2017

Background:

Property assessed clean energy ("PACE") programs enable an unprecedented range of property owners to access energy efficiency, renewable energy, water efficiency and seismic measures that improve the financial, functional, life-safety and environmental aspects of property ownership. Without PACE Programs, many property owners would have no, or costly, access to such benefits.

The CMFA established a PACE Program (the "CMFA PACE Program") to provide financing for the installation of PACE improvements across the State of California. For the public purposes identified by the California Legislature, it is the CMFA's policy to provide financing for the installation of PACE improvements to all qualifying property owners on an equal basis.

Discussion:

The CMFA has been asked to provide financing or refinancing through the CMFA PACE Program for the installation of PACE improvements on those portions of properties located in participating jurisdictions in Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and San Diego Counties that are owned by sectarian organizations ("Participating Properties") and not used primarily for religious worship. It is recommended that the CMFA hold a public hearing to allow all interested persons to object to or inquire about the proposed financings and approve such financing or refinancing, subject to certain conditions:

- (a) The CMFA PACE Program must remain available on an equal basis to secular and sectarian organizations.
- (b) The Program will initially provide financing for the installation of renewable energy, energy efficiency, water efficiency, seismic safety and electric car charging improvements.
- (c) The Program may, in the future, provide financing for the installation on those portions of Participating Properties that are not used primarily for religious worship of other improvements authorized by the California Legislature by amendment of Chapter 29, provided that such improvements will not be used for religious projects.
- (d) The CMFA shall have no responsibility of any kind for the installation, operation or maintenance of the PACE improvements.
- (e) The financing proceeds for the Program must come from private capital providers and the costs of administering the Program must be paid solely by the participating property owners.
- (f) The debt service on the bonds issued by the CMFA for this purpose ("Bonds") must be payable solely from the proceeds of contractual assessments paid by the participating property owners, and the owners of the Bonds shall have no recourse against any funds or assets of the CMFA or any city or county.

It is recommended that the CFMA provide financing for the installation of PACE improvements on those portions of Participating Properties that are not used primarily for religious worship for the purpose of advancing the secular public purposes identified by the California Legislature.

Notice of the Proposed Action:

CMFA provided notice of the public hearing and the proposed approval of financing and refinancing for the installation of PACE improvements on those portions of Participating Properties that are not used primarily for religious worship as follows:

- (i) Published a notice of public hearing once a week for three weeks in the following newspapers of general circulation:
 - Los Angeles Daily Journal
 - Orange County Reporter
 - Riverside Business Journal
 - San Bernardino Sun
 - San Diego Daily Transcript
- (ii) Mailed notice to the American Civil Liberties Union of San Diego and Imperial Counties and the American Civil Liberties Union of Southern California.

The purpose of holding a public hearing and providing notice to interested persons is to establish certainty that the CMFA may provide financing and refinancing for the installation of PACE

improvements on those portions of Participating Properties that are not used primarily for religious worship without a risk of legal challenge.

Pursuant to Government Code §53510 et seq. and the California Code of Civil Procedure §860 et seq., upon approval of the resolution, a 60-day statute of limitations period will commence, during which interested persons may challenge the proposed financing. Pursuant to California Code of Civil Procedure Section 869, after the 60-day period has passed, no party may challenge the proposed financing and refinancing of the installation of PACE Improvements on the portions of Participating Properties that are not used primarily for religious worship as described in the resolution.

Public Benefit:

PACE programs encourage energy and water efficiency and diversifies energy sources, both of which reduce the impact on existing infrastructure. PACE programs further encourage seismic strengthening improvements, which increase the safe use of property. PACE programs provide property owners with a low cost alternative to financing these improvements, thereby advancing the underlying public purposes. The program helps the economies of the communities we serve by creating new jobs and retaining existing jobs.

Recommendation:

The Executive Director recommends that the CMFA Board of Directors Hold a Public Hearing then approve PACE Financing for the Installation of PACE Improvements on those Portions of Properties that are owned by Sectarian Organizations and not Primarily Used for Worship

Background:

With respect to any engagement for professional services with the duration of at least one (1) year, the Board shall conduct a review on a periodic basis to assess and evaluate the performance of the service provider. Such review and assessment shall be conducted at least annually, but may be undertaken more frequently on an "as-needed" basis. The Board may also deliver any performance feedback on an "as-needed" basis. If permitted to terminate an engagement prior to its stated terms, such termination may be based upon the findings and determinations of the performance review.

As part of the periodic review and assessment of a service provider, the Board may evaluate the competiveness of the fees and expenses charged for such services delivered. The Board may also review whether the fees are commensurate with the service and value provided to the CMFA and shall ensure that public funds are expended for measurable, competitively-priced goods and services for all contractors. With respect to any engagement for professional services with the duration of at least three (3) years, such evaluation shall occur at least once every three (3) years by the Board. Based upon the evaluations, the Board may take appropriate actions including the amending of certain terms of an engagement or early termination of such engagement for professional services.

Background:

Jamboree's mission is to create opportunity for their residents with the homes they build and the services they provide. It's an opportunity for families, seniors and those with special needs to access homes they can afford, with distinctive resident services that are responsive and that strengthen the community.

They achieve their mission through the development and construction of new affordable rental and for-sale housing; the preservation of existing affordable housing units through acquisition and rehabilitation; and partnerships with cities to develop broader community and economic opportunities.

Founded in 1990 by the late Lila Lieberthal, a life-long affordable housing advocate, Jamboree has experienced steady growth and geographic expansion. Today, their portfolio includes development and/or ownership interest of nearly 6,300 affordable homes in 61 California communities – topping a market value of \$1 billion.

The Fullerton City Lights Apartments is the acquisition/rehabilitation of 137-unit affordable multifamily apartment project located at 224 East Commonwealth Avenue, Fullerton, CA. The project consists of one .51-acre parcel on which the building sits, in addition to a separate .24-acre surface parking lot. The development has 136 Single Room Occupancy ("SRO") units at approximately 220 square feet each and one 1-bedroom manager's unit at 405 square feet. The project is made up of one 4-story building on a concrete podium deck. The units are currently targeted towards individuals earning between 30% and 60% of AMI. The planned renovations will improve the safety, aesthetics and sustainability of the property by addressing all urgent building issues, completing comprehensive interior and exterior renovations and creating a more sustainable property. The financing of this project will result in the retention of affordable housing for 136 low income individuals in the City of Fullerton for the next 55 years.

Escondido Bioenergy Facility, LLC, a Subsidiary of Anaergia Services will develop, build, own, operate, and finance the Facility as well as seek any available tax incentives and /or grants.

The Escondido Bioenergy Facility will be a \$8.1M fully financed 1.2 MW biogas cogeneration project located onsite at the City of Escondido's Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility ("HARRF") 1521 South Hale Avenue in Escondido, CA 92029 (the "Site"). The Facility is currently early in the development/permitting phase with a target construction start date in the winter of Q1 2017 and commissioning date in Q4 2017.

The loan will be used to finance the acquisition, construction, improvement and equipping of a certain biogas cogeneration project, consisting of two pre-packaged Combined Heat and Power systems and the required gas conditioning and emissions control equipment and certain ancillary and related equipment and facilities, to be located at the City of Escondido's Hale Avenue Resource Recovery Facility ("HARRF"), within the City of Escondido, and to be owned and operated by the Borrower.

HARRF is an activated sludge, secondary treatment wastewater treatment plant that consists of biological processes of which digester gas is a by-product. Digester gas is composed of about 40% carbon dioxide and 60% methane. The Facility consists of two pre-packaged Combined Heat and Power ("CHP") systems, one rated at 800 kW and the other rated at 400 kW, along with required gas conditioning and emissions control equipment. Both of the CHP systems will be integrated into the infrastructure of the existing Facility, and will produce power for delivery to HARRF. The Project will utilize HARRF's digester gas as fuel ("Biogas") and generate both electricity and heat to offset the Facilities electrical power and natural gas demand from the local utility, San Diego Gas and Electric ("SDG&E").

The Facility will be located on HARRF property under a Site License Agreement which is included as Exhibit F of the PPA. As consideration for use of the lands, Anaergia will pay \$10.00 to the City of Escondido prior to Commercial Operation, and will be responsible for property taxes on capital improvements. The main components of the Project will consist of a Gas Conditioning System ("GCS"), a 400 kW CHP engine/generator package, and an 800 kW engine/generator package.


