Background:

InSite Development acquires, rehabilitates and develops properties in the Southern California area for their own portfolio. Insite's affiliated company, Ironwood Management, operates and manages the day to day business of this 2600+ unit, quarter billion-dollar portfolio. InSite's 15+ years of experience in both market rate and affordable multi-family housing allows the team to see opportunities where others may not. The purpose of InSite is to leverage their team's intrinsic energy, creativity, relationships and experience to unleash existing financial resources in partnerships with local social service providers and community leaders to create a true social impact through the creation of new housing. InSites's core strength is the company's ability to identify and move quickly on undervalued land and acquisition/rehabilitation properties and then to creatively secure financing sources to execute its vision for quality housing. The company's geographic focus gives them important competitive advantages and knowledge of local markets, city governments and social economic needs.

InSite Development prides itself in taking a product and making it better by prioritizing rehabilitation, sometimes substantial, and upgrades to create an environment of affordable elegance. Beyond basic rehabilitation repairs like new roofs and paint, InSite also offers amenities such as pools, gyms, tennis courts and panoramic views. But above all else, or perhaps most importantly, InSite Development feature properties are all at low market rent and all in a place anyone would be proud to call home.

The Kensington Campus Apartments project is the new construction of a 51-unit affordable multi-family housing development for the chronically homeless. The project is to be located on land that is currently vacant, located at the corner of Avenue I and 32nd Street in Lancaster, California. The development will consist of 51 one-bedroom units. Rents will be restricted to households making less than 30% of AMI. The units will range in size from 500 to 965 square feet and will consist entirely of 1-bedroom units. The financing of this project will result in the creation 50 affordable apartments in the City of Lancaster for the next 55 years.

Background:

The Mission of Peoples' Self-Help Housing is to provide affordable housing and programs leading to self-sufficiency for low-income families, seniors and other special needs groups on California's Central Coast.

Peoples' Self-Help Housing ("PSHH") is a national award-winning non-profit organization that creates affordable housing and self-sufficiency programs on California's Central Coast; San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, and Ventura Counties.

In 1970 in San Luis Obispo, California, a small group of people and local community leaders were concerned about the lack of affordable housing available to low-income and special needs households. The group learned of a federally sponsored program available to non-profit sponsors to finance the construction of owner built low-income housing. The group incorporated to form Peoples' Self-Help Housing. Since then, the organization has built over 1,100 "sweat equity" and nearly 1,400 affordable rental units. They operate 30 affordable housing complexes in San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties. PSHH has helped over 1,150 first time home buyers build and purchase their first home (residents contribute over 2,000 hours of 'sweat equity' in building their home).

The Sierra Madre Cottages development is the new construction of a 40-unit affordable multifamily senior housing development. The project will be located on a 2.5-acre parcel. The development will consist of ten buildings comprised of four units each in a craftsman style of architecture. The site design integrates into the surrounding community which consists principally of single-family homes. The units will range in size from 700 to 900 square feet and will consist of 1 and 2-bedroom units. Rents will be restricted to 50% and 60% of AMI. The project will include a community room with resident services staff offices, a community kitchen and management office. The project will be located close to public transportation, retail marketplaces and public schools. The financing of this project will result in the creation 39 affordable senior apartments for the next 55 years.

The City of Santa Maria is a member of the CMFA and will be asked to hold a TEFRA hearing. Upon closing, the City is expected to receive approximately \$5,417 as part of the CMFA's sharing of Issuance Fees.

Because Beacon Communities seeks to enhance quality of life, seniors and others with limited resources and/or disabilities will have a safe place to live and access to services they need and deserve.

Older people and others with limited resources and/or disabilities should have the right to experience life to its fullest through self-determination. A caring community recognizes that people are individuals with changing needs and seeks innovative approaches that emphasize each person's wholeness. Beacon's services provide opportunities for personal growth, security, fulfillment and choice. Their heritage leads them to serve older people and others with limited resources and/or disabilities without regard to religious preference.

As a charitable corporation, Beacon Communities exists for and is responsible to the communities they serve. Their comprehensive programs go beyond the provision of services within their own communities and attempts to effect changes within society that lead toward a fuller life for all of us.

The Mt. Rubidoux Manor Apartments is an acquisition/rehabilitation of a 188-unit affordable senior housing development. The retirement community offers studio and one-bedroom apartments with approximately 415-774 square feet per apartment. All units are equipped with a full kitchen, an outdoor deck, air conditioning and an emergency call system. Parking is available on-site and antenna, cable and internet hook-ups are available. The property has a large lounge/community room, exercise room, game area, library, outdoor patio and beauty salon. The project has an on-site service coordinator with access to a variety of on-site classes/ services on health and safety and connection to other community and medical services. 167 of the units will be restricted to 60% or less of Area Median Income, 19 units will be restricted to 50% of Area Median Income and 2 units will be set aside as manager's units. The project is located at 3993 Tenth St., Riverside, CA. This financing will continue to provide 188 units of affordable senior housing for the City of Riverside for the next 55 years.

Background:

EAH Housing ("EAH") is a nonprofit corporation founded with the belief that attractive affordable housing is the cornerstone to sustainable, living communities. Established in 1968, EAH has become one of the largest and most respected nonprofit housing development and management organizations in the western United States. With a staff of over 400, EAH develops low-income housing, manages 97 properties in California and Hawaii, and plays a leadership role in local, regional and national housing advocacy efforts.

Starting from grass-roots origins in response to the death of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., EAH now serves over 20,000 seniors, families, students, people with disabilities, frail elderly and the formerly homeless. Combining award winning design, innovative on-site services and a commitment to people, EAH reflects the distinctive personality of each community.

EAH is dedicated to building communities that enhance the surrounding neighborhoods. The organization has developed 83 properties with an aggregate value of more than \$1 billion, and manages 9,100 units in 49 municipalities in California and Hawaii. EAH has received multiple national awards for property management, eleven design awards and numerous commendations from legislators on the federal, state and local levels.

The CMFA has facilitated over ten EAH projects.

The Fellowship Plaza II Apartments is an acquisition/rehabilitation of an existing affordable housing multi-family project. The project is a 150-unit multi-family residential rental facility located at 14520 Fruitvale Avenue, Saratoga, CA. The project is in need of substantial rehabilitation due to the age of the development. Building exterior renovations will consist of stucco replacement, deck replacement, roofing, gutters, windows, exterior doors and repairing damaged wood. Interior renovations will include enlarging the reconfiguration of the community building, renovate and add additional washers and dryers to laundry rooms, provide new flooring and paint and modernize elevators. Individual apartment units will be updated with new toilets, faucets, showerheads and unit heating systems will be replaced. Lastly, common or site area renovations will consist of asphalt repair, reconfigure existing handicapped parking, re-route pathways, install new drought-tolerant landscaping, replace irrigation system and replace existing carports. This financing will preserve 148 units of affordable housing for the City of Saratoga for another 55 years.

Background:

For 30 years, Resources for Community Development ("RCD") has created and preserved affordable housing for very low-income individuals and families. Thousands of low-income families have benefitted from rent that's within their means, allowing them to live independently. For low-income seniors, working families and people with special needs – the Mission of RCD is to create and preserve affordable housing for them, to build community and enrich lives.

Rents in the Bay Area have been relatively high for many years. That's what motivated a group of Berkeley community members to found the non-profit to address the problem of an inadequate supply of safe, affordable housing for low-income people who were being pressured to leave the community because of rising rents. Today, RCD continues to look for opportunities to work together with the community to reimagine, recreate, and redefine how to provide affordable homes, for a better future for those with the fewest options.

RCD serves low-income people with household incomes of 20 to 60 percent of the Area Median Income (up to \$56,100 for a family of four in the Bay Area). Starting with a range of housing options, from studios and single room occupancy to four bedroom apartments, RCD also reserves over 30 percent of our units for people with special needs.

The CMFA has facilitated four other projects with RCD.

The scattered site rehabilitation of the Idaho Apartments and Church Lane Apartments will consist of the preservation of 51 affordable apartments located on sites in El Cerrito, Richmond and San Pablo, CA. Each project has close proximity to neighborhood and community amenities, including parks, schools, shopping, and ample bus service. The Idaho Apartments include 28 studio units providing supportive housing for homeless households, plus one managers unit. The Church Lane site provides 21-units of housing for large families, plus one manager's unit.

The Idaho Apartments is an existing affordable housing property at 10203 San Pablo Avenue in El Cerrito. The site consists of two parcels totaling 25,440sf which straddle the El Cerrito and Richmond Border. The site was originally developed in the 1940's as a motel, and in 1997 was acquired, rehabilitated and converted to affordable housing. The site includes 7 one- and two-story buildings. The project will provide services and property management office surrounding a central landscaped courtyard and surface parking. Additionally, the site amenities include a community room, computers, kitchen and laundry facilities. The unit mix includes 28 studio units, each with bathroom and kitchen, as well as a one-bedroom manager's unit.

The Church Lane Apartments, located at 2555 Church Lane, San Pablo, is an existing 22-unit large family property. The property includes one 3-story building and one 4-story building connected by elevated walkways and served by an elevator. The project was originally constructed in 1997. The site totals .96 acres and includes seven 1-bedroom, seven 2- bedroom, six 3-bedroom and two 4-bedroom units.

The financing of this project will result in preservation of affordable housing for 49 low-income households in the Cities of El Cerrito, Richmond and San Pablo for another 55 years.

The County of Contra Costa:

The County of Contra Costa is a member of the CMFA and held a TEFRA hearing on July 7, 2017. Upon closing, the County is expected to receive approximately \$8,250 as part of the CMFA's sharing of Issuance Fees.

Turning Point School is an independent, nonsectarian, coeducational school enrolling students in Primary (2 years, 10 months) through Middle School grade 8. Turning Point School strives to address the comprehensive educational needs of the whole, multi-faceted child. The child is the focus and the teacher the facilitator.

Turning Point approaches each child's academic, creative, emotional, physical and social development as a unique and interconnected process. From the early years through adolescence, their goal is to provide students with age-appropriate educational and developmental experiences that encourage them to learn by making connections.

An experienced, perceptive faculty works to cultivate a familial environment in which each student can achieve his or her potential. Rather than imposing a finite, generalized body of knowledge, our curriculum stresses experience and the application of skills, tools, and understanding as the most effective method to build confidence and character.

Through a multitude of methods and environments, they work to engage their students in the learning process. By making it relevant to them personally, by helping the students reflect on who they are and how they, as individual citizens, can apply their knowledge, Turning Point releases them solidly into the world. They emerge from Turning Point School self-assured in the quality of their ideas and actions, confident in their abilities, and well prepared for the path ahead.

The proceeds of the Bonds were intended to be used to refund the CMFA's Variable Rate Demand Revenue Bonds (Turning Point School) Series 2009 originally issued to finance (1) the renovation, construction and equipping of educational facilities of the Corporation including but not limited to new classrooms and a theater in an existing 61,000 square-foot building, and additional parking spaces on real property adjacent to the Corporation's existing educational facilities and other improvements to educational facilities for use as part of the Corporation's primary, elementary and middle school campuses, and (2) the refunding of \$12,000,000 original principal amount of the California Statewide Communities Development Authority Revenue Bonds (Turning Point) Series 2001, the proceeds of which financed educational facilities at the Corporation's existing campus (the proposed improvements and the improvements financed with the proceeds of the 2001 Bonds are collectively referred to as the "Project").

Amendments: The CMFA previously issued its Revenue Bonds (Turning Point School), Series 2010 (the "Series 2010 Bonds") in three separate subseries, 2010A, 2010B and 2010C (each a "Subseries") pursuant to the Act, Resolution No. 10-73 of the Authority adopted October 8, 2010, and a Bond Trust Indenture dated as of December 1, 2010, between the Authority and U.S. Bank National Association, as bond trustee, and provided a loan of the proceeds of the Series 2010 Bonds to and for the benefit of MWLA, Inc., d/b/a Turning Point School, a nonprofit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of California, under a Loan Agreement dated as of December 1, 2010 between the Authority and the Borrower U.S. Bank National Association, as the initial purchaser of the Series 2010 Bonds, owns 100% of the outstanding Series 2010 Bonds. In connection with the extension of the Purchaser's commitment to own Subseries of the Series 2010 Bonds and certain proposed modifications to the terms of the Series 2010 Bonds, including interest rate provisions, the Borrower and the Purchaser have proposed one or multiple amendments of the Series 2010 Bond Indenture and one or multiple amendments of the Tax Compliance Agreement for the Series 2010 Bonds dated as of December 1, 2010, for the purposes set forth in the Amendments including amending Section 202(c) of the Series 2010 Bond Indenture; and amendments and supplements to the Series 2010 Bond Indenture and the Series 2010 Tax Agreement are authorized pursuant to the terms thereof for certain purposes specified therein; and the Authority finds and determines that it is necessary and desirable in connection with the Series 2010 Bonds that the Authority amend the Series 2010 Bond Indenture and the Series 2010 Tax Agreement by executing the Amendments and that the Authority execute and deliver certain documents and take certain other actions.
